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### **Study Sites, Texts and Libraries**

*Theological Library* (<http://www.shc.edu/theolibrary/>).

Although this site, now hosted at Spring Hill College, has a simple style, it is very rich with over 8000 links.

- **Categories include:** Church, Evangelization, Justice, Liturgy, Morality, Religion, Revelation, Spirituality, and Theology.

*Religion On-Line* (<http://www.religion-online.org/>).

This site holds more than 6,000 full text articles and chapters that by recognized and well known theologians. Site maintained by the Claremont School of Theology.

- **Categories include:** Old and New Testament, Churches and Society, Communication, Cultural Studies, Education, Ethics, Local Churches, History of Religion, Missions, Practical Theology, Religious Sociology, Social Issues, Theology, and Theologians.

*BELIEVE Religious Information Source* (<http://mb-soft.com/believe/index.html>).

This collection of roughly 1,500 articles by respected scholars touches on 700 religious subjects.

- **Categories include:** The Bible, Central and Technical Christian Subjects, Christian Structures, Denominations and Groups, Early Christian Manuscripts, The Early Church, New Testament Subjects, The Reformation, Statements of Faith, and Other Religions.

*Christian Classics Etherial Library* (<http://www.ccel.org/>).

Run by Calvin College, this site is a digital library of hundreds of classic Christian titles.

This guide was arranged according to major areas of concentration in St. John's School of Theology Seminary to assist searchers of theological and religious information on the Internet.
